

NACAC Opposes House Reconciliation Bill

NACAC's <u>vision</u> is that the transformative power of postsecondary education is available to all who seek it. To get there, we need policymakers who recognize higher education as the <u>public</u> good that it is.

The House Reconciliation bill is a disaster. It would:

Further Erode Need-Based Financial Aid and Increase Debt for Millions of Students

- It cuts Pell Grant access for students by imposing new eligibility barriers, including halftime enrollment requirements and Student Aid Index thresholds.
- It disproportionately harms low-income students who depend on flexible pathways to persist and complete their degrees.
- It eliminates interest subsidies for undergraduate borrowers, ends Graduate PLUS loans, and limits access to Parent PLUS loans — forcing students and families to rely on riskier and more expensive private debt.
- It increases monthly payments for the lowest-income borrowers, extends repayment timelines to 30 years, and eliminates hardship protections like forbearance and deferment.

Worsens the Student Debt Trap

- It eliminates the current income-driven repayment system with a single, less flexible plan, the Repayment Assistance Program (TRAP).
- It removes hardship protections and pushes struggling borrowers into longer repayment terms and higher monthly payments especially those with the lowest incomes.

Exponentially Increases Risk of Waste, Fraud, and Abuse

• It repeals key student protections, including the 90/10 rule, gainful employment standards, borrower defense, and closed school discharge. These safeguards were put in place to prevent fraud and abuse by low-quality, high-cost programs — especially in the for-profit sector — and have been particularly important for student veterans.

Role and Infrastructure of the Department of Education

• It strips critical regulatory authority from the Secretary of Education and limits the Education Department's ability to implement and enforce student protections.
